#### Taken from Read your way to better English - article by Bill Bowler

Global Issues – important problems affecting our world – are in the news at present. Recently French President Emanuel Macron tweeted, 'Our house is burning. Literally. The Amazon rainforest – the lungs which produce 20% of our planet's oxygen – is on fire. It is an international crisis.' You can follow the Twitter discussion on this topic with the hashtag #ActForTheAmazon.

Last year Greta Thunberg, the teenage Swedish climate activist, founded SS4C (School strike for climate) to protest climate change. On 20<sup>th</sup> September this year, there was a Climate Change Strike in the UK. What better time, then, to make sure you have a copy of the Stage 3 Oxford Bookworms Library factfile *Global Issues* in your school library, or a class set to use as a class reader.

The United Nations lists, on its website, 17 sustainable development goals: https://www.un.org/sustainabledevelopment/sustainable-development-goals/. These are:

- 1) No poverty
- 2) Zero hunger
- 3) Good health and well-being
- 4) Quality education
- 5) Gender equality
- 6) Clean water and sanitation
- 7) Affordable and clean energy
- 8) Decent work and economic growth
- 9) Industry, innovation and infrastructure
- 10) Reduced inequalities
- 11) Sustainable cities and communities
- 12) Responsible consumption and production
- 13) Climate action
- 14) Life below water
- 15) Life on land
- 16) Peace, justice and strong institutions
- 17) Partnerships

You could explore some of the above issues using the *Global Issues* book, along with other Oxford readers like the Dominoes reader *Green Planet*, the Oxford Bookworms Factfile *Climate Change*, or the Read and Discover titles *Life in Rainforests, Why we Recycle*, and *Caring for Our Planet*.

If you like, ask your students to fill in the <u>questionnaire download</u>, based on the UN's sustainable goals. Students can discuss their finished questionnaires in pairs or small groups before you have a whole class discussion.

One thing is clear, if we don't change our ways, we risk destroying the delicate balance of life on Earth, and creating an incredibly hostile environment for humanity in the

future. If politicians and business people continue to look at short term gains, rather than long-term benefits, ordinary people need to make their voices heard so that those in power act to solve the growing problems in our world.

Would you like to do some work on the vocabulary in the reader *Global Issues*? Then use the 'Ring the changes with multiple choice' download. It contains three multi-choice task sheets covering the same words but designed for weaker learners (dual options), midlevel learners (three options), and higher level learners (four options). Whichever task sheet different learner groups complete, the answers are as follows:

#### Answer key

1 astronaut, 2 to develop, 3 local, 4 migration, 5 environment, 6 to protect, 7 economy, 8 material, 9 issue, 10 human rights

You might also want to try a fly swatting multi-choice activity using the <u>powerpoint/pdf</u> <u>download</u> and the <u>ABCD letter cards download</u>. You will also need a computer and slide projector, blue tack, two different coloured fly swatters, and a hand bell. (See the instructions below.)

#### Fly swatting Multi-choice Activity Instructions

- 1 Stick the letter cards A, B, C and D with blue tack on the wall at the front of the class.
- 2 Divide the class down the middle into two teams. Make sure there is a central aisle between the teams wide enough for two students to stand side by side. Give the teams names to match the fly swatter colours (for example, blue and red).
- 3 Choose a captain for each team and have them stand. Give each the appropriate fly swatter. The captains should each choose four 'runners' from their team to join them.
- 4 Ask the teams to go to the back of the class, each team lined up behind their captain, who stands with fly swatter in hand, at the end of the aisle.
- 5 Show the first powerpoint slide, give a moment for students to read, then ring your bell. At the sound of the bell, the captains must run down the aisle and hit the correct letter with the fly swatter. The person who hits the correct letter first wins 10 points for their team.
- 6 After this, each captain hands the fly swatter to the next runner in their team and g oes to the back of their line. Repeat step 5. Team members who are sitting and watching can shout out instructions to help the runners. The process continues until all questions are answered and the winning team is announced.
- 7 Deduct 5 points for each of the following: running before the bell is rung, hitting more than one letter, and pushing members of the opposing team.
- Global issues are definitely a serious topic, but there's no reason why students can't also have fun in a lesson devoted to them!
